### **Book Title:**

The very hungry caterpillar's POP-UP PLAYMAT

### **Aesthetics/Size**

This is a very short 4 pages long but full of different drawings, colors and textures book. I think that for its target market (babies and toddlers), the colors used are very fitting and appropriate. Colors used are very bright and a variety of shades are also used. This book also plays around with all kinds of different materials/textures from a silky fabric for the flowers, felt for clouds, glitter texture for waves in the sea to a rough material to act as a turtle's shell which are all very different from each other. The images used are very clear, big and simple with labels underneath. The images are also very kids friendly and easy to understand such as the sun, rainbow, clous, birds and all sorts of simple big drawings of nature, animals and more. The different textures and large and simple drawings are used to help toddlers feel, touch and to help toddlers learn the different images and also to feel the textures to make them understand them more. The cover of the book is also very colorful with the simple drawings which clearly shows what to expect to be inside the book. The designer got his inspiration from a very famous book called "the very hungry caterpillar" which he based his idea on and made it for even younger people by enlarging the pictures, creating a 'POP-UP BOOK' version which has a surface which opens up when the book is opened and he even changed the story by just adding around 4 words in each page. He even added texture and played around with the colors.

### **Consumer (customer)**

This book is designed for babies and toddler. The book could be carried around anywhere and placed on the floor for the babies/toddler to lie down next to and play with the different textures and look at the big pictures illustrated in each page as shown in the back cover. As written on the back of the book, the impact that this book will have on the toddlers/babies are: It encourages interactive play and fold out books with exciting touch-and-feel textures will entertain them. This means that they will learn all the different names of things with the help of the big images and labels and different textures. This product is promoted to attract its customers not only by all the different, bright and colorful pictures and texture, but at the back of the book their are also many little sentences and pictures advertising the product by saying what the customers will get out of buying their product and how it is used.

# Environment

This book is manufactured and made up of many different materials such as felt, silky fabric, hard cardboard, glitter, holographic paper and many more materials used to create the different textures on the book meaning that many trees and lots of energy from factories were used just to make this one product, especially with the various materials used to make textures. However, after disposal or after a while, it could be reused or recycled.

# Safety/Size

Since this book is particularly designed, for a very young group of people, it needs to be very safe which is why this design did not use any small pieces which could be ripped off and easily swallowed and the binding and pieces were joined very well together. Even though toddlers intend to put anything in their mouth, all the pieces are way bigger than their mouth and is impossible for them to even chew on because of how hard the cardboard material used for the cover is.

# Function

This book is very easy to use and functions well for many reasons. The best thing about this book is that it is very durable and the cover is made up of very hard materials as well as the fold up part meaning that it would be nearly impossible for toddlers to rip and chew it. This book is very durable because the binding and the pages are secured very well together as well as the bottom fold up part. The fold up part is also very simple shaped (semi circle) which also makes it very easy to fold back together especially with the fold created in the middle. This also makes the book very easy to use and carry anywhere and even last longer.

# Materials

This book uses a variety of different materials, as mentioned before such as felt, silky fabric, hard bumpy material and glitter to create different textures for each picture. All materials used were very different from the other and are also very durable meaning they should last a very long time. I also believe that the choice of materials were very good because they all fit in very well with the picture. However, I think that the rough material representing the shell/back of the turtle could be a bit less rough especially since it is made for toddlers/babies.

# Ergonomics

Even though there are barely any text in this book, there are labels for each picture which are in very clear font but not very big and do not stand out next to the picture. However, since this is a book made for a very young age group which can't read at all, the writing is not as important as the picture in this case and are probably just there for the parents to read to the toddlers/babies to make it easier for them to learn later on. The pages are very easy to turn but maybe too heavy for a toddler and the book itself is not too heavy but the book is made to be placed on the floor and not be carried around.

### Example: Brief for a guitar stand

*After looking at existing products and receiving feedback from my target market I have decided to redesign the current guitar stands which are available on the market in order to meet the several specifications stated below.*

*The stand must be:*

- The stand must be **portable**. This is one of the most important factors when designing the new stand as it seems to be one of the biggest problems with current guitar stands.*
- The stand must be **stable**. Many guitar stands can be easily pushed over, which defeats the purpose of having a stand, so it must be very stable.*
- It must be **affordable**. Guitar stands are vital, and so companies take advantage of this fact, increasing the prices on an extremely simple product.*
- It must **protect the guitar's** condition. Several guitar have scratches and small indents because of the guitar stands lack of padding and support.*

### Brief for a pop-up book

After looking at existing pop-up books in the class as well as creating a survey for my target market which are the grade 3 students, I have set several specifications which are stated below to help know what I must have in my design to suit my target market.

**The pop-up book must have/be:**

1. The pop up book should be Portable meaning that it should not be not too big or too small and a perfect size to be carried around with (also not heavy)
2. It must be good quality→ have good binding and pieces secure and do not fall off or tear apart
3. The pop up book must be about “*what’s inside something or how things work*” and at the same time interesting & enjoyable(attracts attention) by grade 3 kids or else it will defeat the purpose of creating this pop-up book-suitable subject for kids at this age-something that will attract attention
4. The pop-up book must include at least some or even most of the answers of the survey to make sure the pop-up book will attract the target market-base story on what kids at this age enjoy
5. The pop-up book must be easy to use(flaps sturdy and not fragile/easy to rip) has to be durable
6. The pop-up book must include a little writing with a lot more pop-up drawings to show the story

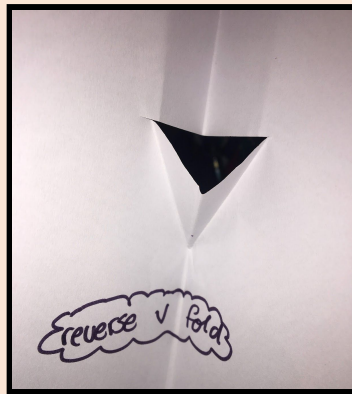
After the survey, I realized that my pop-up book must be based on a fairy tale to make the target market want to read it. My location will be set in a castle which is where most fairytale stories are set. To help grab the target market's attention, I need to showcase clearly what my pop-up book is about. The cover must include the setting of this story as well as a garden, a princess and flowers in the background to help clearly show where this story takes place and what the story is even about.	✓✓✓✓ ✓✓✓

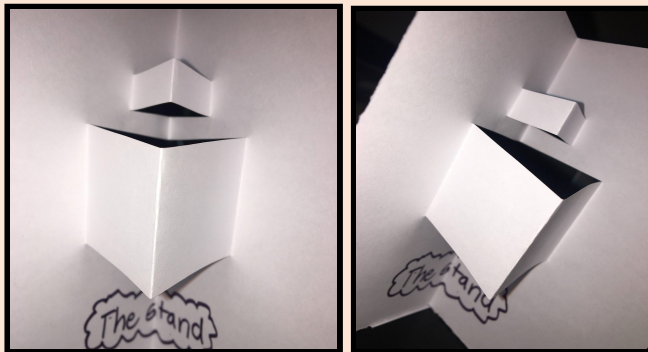
In term of ergonomics and social and moral specifications, there are lots of things to consider such as the text size, font, color, the actual size of the pop-up book, appropriate illustrations for target market and the language style. According to my survey, my target audience find a book more enjoyable when there are more pictures than small texts and easily get uninterested when there are too many words to read which is why I need to use big, clear fonts with a few words to label objects. Colors like red, orange and blue for texts are going to be used the most since they stand out the most. The pop-up book itself should be small enough and light enough to be carried around and put in a purse (not too big and not too small). The language used should be very kids friendly and simple (the "what's inside something or how things work" theme does not require much writing and mostly labelings and drawings).	✓✓✓✓ ✓✓✓✓ ✓

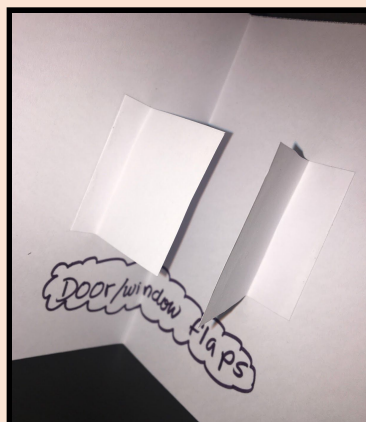

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This is the first technique of pop-up that I experimented with. This first pop-up technique is called the reverse v fold. I created this fold by first folding a piece of paper in half and cutting a slit in between. Then, I started folding the creases inwards to create a 3D affect. However, This many not be able to use this popup technique because it does not suit my theme and my idea for my pop-up story. But this reverse v fold could be used in a pop-up book for a mouth for a frog,dinosaur or any other type of imaginary creature which is not what I will do for my pop-up book. Instead, folds like the stand,door/window flaps and those type of folds may be more useful.

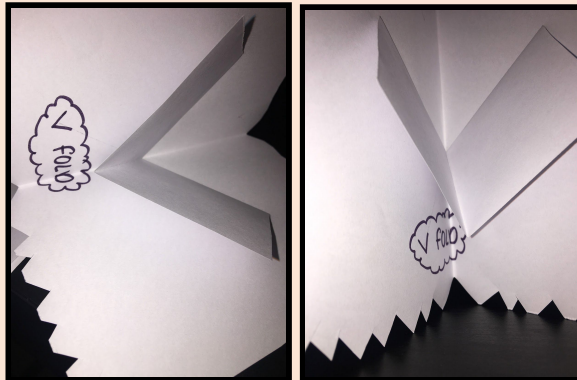


This next popup technique is called the stand. This popup is very easy to create. First,I folded a piece of paper in half and cut 2 slits opposite each other. Then, I started folding those slits to create creases to all 3 sides just like I did for the reverse v fold. This Popup technique is very useful and will be used a lot in my final popup book not only because of how easy it is to create, but also because I can create many things to do with castles with this fold such as a box or I could even cut this stand in the middle to form a door or window.

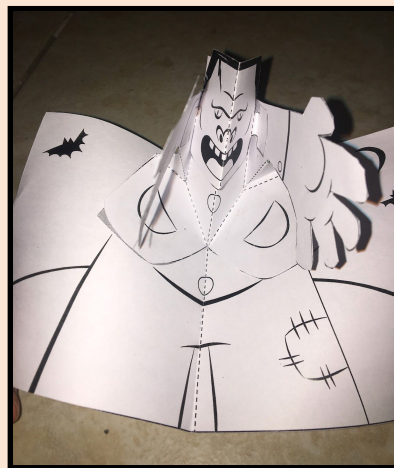


This pop-up technique is called the door/window flaps which is used to create any windows,doors and any other opening. This will be very useful and suitable for my "what's inside something or how

things work" theme. This could either be created by doing a stand popup and cutting through the middle or by cutting 2 squares out of paper, folding one end and gluing it down onto a folded piece of paper. The first option is better as it is more durable than the second option because the second option has flaps glued onto the paper meaning that it would be easier to tear or fall off after it is being used too much by younger ages especially if the glue is not strong enough. ✓✓✓✓✓✓✓✓✓✓✓✓



The final popup technique is the v fold, similar to the reverse fold but it was made differently. This fold is created by drawing on a piece of paper, creating a triangle edge on one side and cutting them up. Then, glue those triangle edged rectangles onto a folded piece of paper at whatever angle you would like for different uses. The good thing about this fold is that it could be used as different things depending on the angle. ✓✓✓✓✓✓✓✓



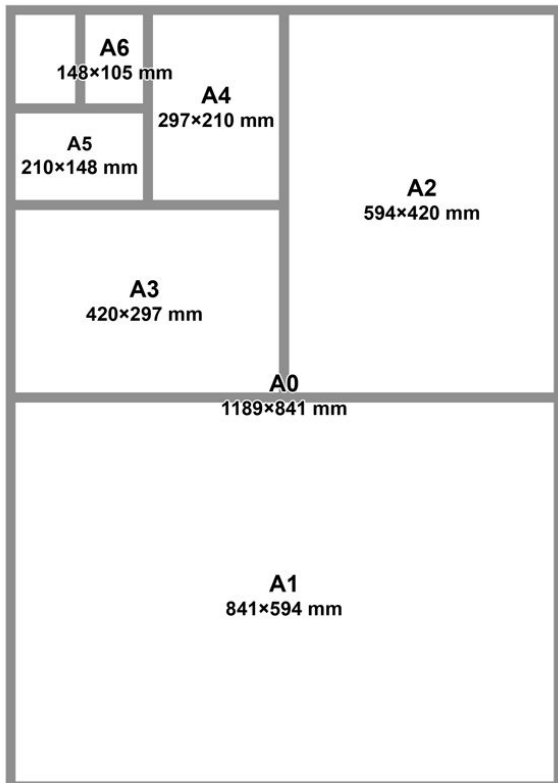
This pop-up required many popup techniques/folds such as the mountain and valley folds. Mountain folds are folds which are folded upwards and valley fold are folds which are folded inwards to create a v shape inwards when unfolded. This pop up was created by cutting the body template with an exacto knife on a cutting board to prevent damaging the surface of tables. Then, folding the creases into either a mountain or valley fold across the dotted lines. Next, the feet of the frankenstein is glued to where the shaded shapes are on the other part of the frankenstein. The head is cut out separately also using an exacto knife and then glued from the sides onto the rest of the body. Mountain and valley folds used together create a 3 dimensional look/perspective of the pop-up which could be useful when trying to create a 3D effect. ✓✓✓✓✓✓✓✓✓✓✓✓✓✓✓✓

# Paper and Card Theory 1



Paper comes in many different sizes. The most commonly used ones are classified in the “A” series, e.g. those given on this page are prefixed by the letter A. They are mostly used for technical drawing and are based on the A0 size which has a 1m squared area. The smaller sizes fit within the A0 size, i.e. 2 x A1 sheets = A0

The thickness of a paper can be measured scientifically in units called “microns”. However, the thickness is more often recorded using grammages. These indicate the weight in grams of one square metre (sometimes written as gsm) of the paper concerned. Photocopy paper and printer paper are usually 80gsm.

A3 is the best size for most technical drawings and for your course work.

A4 is the standard size for a lot of text.

# Paper and Card Theory 2

It is important to choose the correct type of paper and board to achieve the best quality finish. Papers come in various weights as well as sizes. For example a particular paper may be 100 grams per metre squared (gm<sup>2</sup> or gms). This refers to the weight of one square metre.

**Anything over 200 gms is classified as board.**

<p><b>Tracing Paper</b> Transparent, hard and strong, its translucency makes it suitable for tracing fine details, drawn with fine lines. Its strength makes it easy to scrape off errors using a scalpel. Used for working drawings.</p>		<p><b>Cartridge paper / photocopy paper</b> Good quality surface for pencils, pens and markers. The soft surface can be used with crayons, pastels, inks, watercolours and gouache. Used for design drawings, sketching and for good quality marker pen presentations.</p>
<p><b>Corrugated Card</b> Two more layers of card with fluted inner section to add strength with very little increase in weight. Used for packaging objects which need protection during transportation.</p>		<p><b>Layout Paper – ‘Detail Paper’</b> A thin, fairly transparent white paper which provides a cheap medium for designers to use for visualising a project or design. Used in preparation of final ideas to trace images.</p>
<p><b>Bleed-proof Paper</b> Has similar qualities to cartridge paper but specifically good at isolating water-based paints and pens so they don't run into areas where you don't want them. Used in high quality presentations.</p>		<p><b>Sugar Paper</b> Coloured paper which has contrasting colours for use in tonal drawings. Different weights and textures are available for different activities. Used for display work and for mounting drawings, posters etc. but fades in sunlight.</p>
<p><b>White Board</b> This is a strong medium whose surface has been bleached to provide an excellent surface for printing. Used for good quality packaging and book covers.</p>		<p><b>Ink-jet Card</b> This type of card is treated so it can pass through inkjet printers. Used to achieve high quality print finishes.</p>

## Material

What materials did you use to create your greeting card?

For this pop-up birthday card, the materials that I have used are white card paper for the card's base where I cut my stand pop-ups and glued why flap pop-up on, different sized and colored paper strips for the cake design on all 3 layers, a sheet of pink paper which was glued at the back of the the top right corner to show color underneath the pop-up when it is opened up, a glue stick to glue the colorful strips of paper down on each layer, a pair of scissors to cut the slits for my pop-ups and cut out the "happy birthday to you". ✓✓✓✓✓

The only cutting equipment that I used for this was a pair of scissors to cut the slits of the stand pop-up, cut out the "happy birthday to you" paper and to cut the edges of the white card paper for extra decor. Especially with this type of paper, a pair of scissors is strong enough to cut through card paper as it is not as hard as a white board which requires a table saw which is way sharper and stronger but at the same time not as thin as bleedproof paper which easily rips off. ✓✓✓✓✓

You used 2 different types of paper in this experimentation. Which type of paper was more effective? Explain why.

I used card paper and a regular sheet of A4 paper for this experiment. After this experimentation, I have concluded that card paper is more effective in many ways. The main problem which occurs in a regular sheet of paper and not while using card paper is durability. A regular sheet of paper is very light, fragile and not very durable as it is most likely to fold easily, crumble up and rip unlike card paper which is slightly heavier and more durable as it is thicker but still not too thick to work with and cut through it with a regular pair of scissor. ✓✓✓✓✓

What points do you have to take into consideration in the creation of your pop-up book with regards to paper quality?

The main point that I have to consider in creation of my pop-up book with regards to paper quality is the durability because different types of paper are more durable than the other especially regarding my young target markets. The paper durability is very important as it link to other points like binding which requires to have high quality and durable paper to have proper and strong binding suitable for such a young target market. When I start creating folds and creases, the types of paper used becomes important because different types of paper weigh differently so if the cover of the paper is made up of paper too weak and light and then heavier paper is glued onto it, the pop-up will rip and damage easily. ✓✓✓✓✓✓✓✓

This website is very useful as it showcases many types of pop-up techniques with pictures and animation to help explain it step by step. The explanations and steps were very clear and useful as it helped me experiment with different types of folds before doing my birthday card such as the stand, v-folds and many more. All pop-up techniques were very varied and different from the other and all was explained in a clear way which are the stand, v-fold, door/window flaps and the reverse v fold which all require slightly different steps. ✓✓✓✓

How many techniques did you try/progress in terms of the technique

The most simple technique which I decided to use for my final birthday card was the stand not only because it is the most simple one with this one fold, so many things could be done such as a shape, letter or a specific design. However, I did use the window/door flap for the text instead because there were too many letters and it would be very hard to create a pop-up for each one especially with the amount of space left in the bottom of the card. ✓✓✓✓✓

Describe each technique

**Stand:** This popup technique is called the stand. This popup is very easy to create. First, I folded a piece of paper in half and cut 2 slits opposite each other. Then, I started folding those slits to create creases to all 3 sides just like I did for the reverse v fold. This Popup technique is very useful and will be used a lot in my final popup book not only because of how easy it is to create, but also because I can create many things to do with castles with this fold such

as a box or I could even cut this stand in the middle to form a door or window. ✓✓✓✓✓

**Door/window flaps:** This pop-up technique is called the door/window flaps which is used to create any windows, doors and any other opening. This will be very useful and suitable for my “*what’s inside something or how things work*” theme. This could either be created by doing a stand popup and cutting through the middle or by cutting 2 squares out of paper, folding one end and gluing it down onto a folded piece of paper. The first option is better as it is more durable than the second option because the second option has flaps glued onto the paper meaning that it would be easier to tear or fall off after it is being used too much by younger ages especially if the glue is not strong enough. ✓✓✓✓✓
